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## \$1,000 increase probable

Administrators are close to proposing a \$1,000 tuition increase for resident undergraduates and a \$1,250 increase for resident graduate students, Provost George Davis said yesterday.

Although President Pete Likins will not officially announce his tuition proposal until Monday, Davis said that officials have zeroed in on those numbers. Student leaders may still attempt to influence the final proposal between now and Monday.

Davis added that administrators are likely to propose a \$1,250 increase for out-of-state undergraduates and a \$1,500 increase for out-of-state graduate students.

"Look at the environment we're in right now," Davis said. "We need money to be able to support our programs."

Money has been hard to come by for the UA. Over the past two years the state has cut \$44 million from the university's budget, causing a financial crisis that has been exacerbated by UA's low tuition, Davis said.

Because UA currently has the lowest tuition in the country, administrators have said they want to eventually raise tuition to the top of the bottom one-third percentile, meaning UA will rank around 35th rather than 50th.

That goal would be realized with a \$1,000 tuition increase.

In order to offset the impact of a tuition increase on needy students, administrators have pledged a dramatic increase in financial aid.

There will be an \$11 million increase in financial aid for undergraduates and a \$2.6 million increase in financial aid for graduate students in the drafted

## 'Cats declawed by Cardinal

Basketball suffers first conference loss against unranked Stanford

There goes a chance at an undefeated Pacific 10 Conference season.

Stanford came into a packed McKale Center last night and stunned the top ranked Arizona men's basketball team 82-77.

This marks the third consecutive year that the Cardinal has defeated the Wildcats on their home floor — the loss is the first at home for UA since Stanford's triumph last season.

"We have had some great wins on their court and they have had some on our court," UA head coach Lute Olson said. "We can't make the number of mistakes that we made with the ball. We have to do a better job of taking care of the ball. We just made too many mistakes."

Arizona (15-2 overall, 7-1 Pac-10) has been unable to sustain a consistent level of play for the entirety of a game and the same was true against the Cardinal (15-5, 6-2 Pac-10).

"We made a great run at the end," Olson said. "But our energy level was not there when we needed it the most."

The Wildcats dug themselves a 14-point hole with 11:39 remaining in the game.

## Hike will strain internationals

For over 3,000 international students, the proposed tuition raise for next semester means they'll have to dig deeper to come up with enough money to continue their schooling in the United States.

A possible \$1,250 tuition hike will put a strain on a large portion of those students, many of whom pay out-of-state tuition, said Joanne Lagasse-Long, director of the international student program and services.

"For a lot of families, that's a lot of money," she said.

Each international student must prove they have enough money to cover individual costs in the United States. This year, the set amount needed is \$22,841, said Lagasse-Long, a total that must be met before a student can receive a visa.
