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Kidnapping attempt fails

A student was the victim of an attempted kidnapping Monday night, police said.

The 23-year-old student was riding her bike near North Euclid Avenue and East Elm Street at about 9:30 p.m. when the incident occurred. As she rode her bicycle, a man with blond hair driving a red sport utility vehicle stepped out of his car and tried to grab the student, said University of Arizona Police Department Commander Brain Seastone.

The man was unsuccessful in getting the student into

his car, and the student was able to ride her bike away from the man, and contact police later.

Police stopped a car matching the suspect's vehicle description later that night. Officers took the student to identify the man, and she said she believed it was not the same man who attempted to abduct her, police said.

UAPD has not ruled him out as a suspect.

Police said they would make a report on the incident available today.

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Lifeline offers free cab rides

It's Napolitano, Salmon

PHOENIX — Attorney General Janet Napolitano won the Democratic nomination for governor Tuesday while former U.S. Rep. Matt Salmon beat two rivals for the GOP nomination.

With 87 percent of precincts reporting, Napolitano had 58 percent of the vote in the Democratic race that also featured former Senate majority leader Alfredo Gutierrez, physician and



ballot-drive organizer Mark Osterloh and physician Mike Newcomb.

Also with 87 percent of precincts reporting, Salmon had 56 percent of the vote, with the rest divided between Secretary of State Betsey Bayless and state

Treasurer Carol Springer.

Libertarians Gary Fallon and Barry Hess were neck and neck in their primary.

Republicans' control of state government during the past decade and the state's current budget troubles will be an issue during the campaign, Napolitano said. "It's time for a change. Arizona needs new leadership."

Salmon said voters would have a "very clear choice" between himself

and Napolitano, "a very liberal lawyer with a very different record."

Gutierrez, the Democratic runner-up, said he would not endorse any of the remaining candidates because none have pledged to avoid deep budget cuts in essential services by raising taxes. "This simply can't be about cuts," he said.

Bayless was the second-place finisher in the
