GLENDALE — Friends and coworkers gathered yesterday at a makeshift memorial to remember two Wal-Mart employees who were shot to death in a store parking lot, allegedly by a man who was mentally disturbed.

"You'll be missed and forever in our hearts," read an inscription on one poster that was left amid candles, teddy bears and flowers assembled in front of the Wal-Mart Supercenter in this Phoenix suburb. On Tuesday, a gunman drove up, got out of his car and began shooting at two employees, police said.

UA pres. search committee formed

A search committee has formed and is in the process of finding a replacement for President Peter Likins next fall.

Regent Fred Boice of Tucson will be chairing the committee with the sole purpose of seeking out, interviewing and eventually appointing a new president.

Members of the committee, still in its developing stages, have been selected and will have their first official meeting on Sept. 8, at 2 p.m.

To further the selection process, an academic executive search group, called the Academic Search Consultation Service of Washington, D.C., has been selected after a careful screening and interview process, according to the Arizona Board of Regents Web site.

Student Regent Ben Graff, who is a third-year law student, was selected by Boice to be one of the two students who will serve on the committee.

"This is a great responsibility and a lot of positive pressure at the same time," Graff said."Knowing that you are playing a role not only in determining such an important position but the future and integrity of the university as well really makes one

think."

Graff said selecting who will be included in the committee was not easy for Boice, who was unavailable for comment because he is out of town until Sept. 2.

When the formal committee announcement was made, the Graduate and Professional Student Council approached Graff and Boice about securing a seat for one of their members.

Graff said though he discussed the issue with Boice in great detail, both decided Associated Students

Sgt. Tim Brunenkant, Marana Police Department spokesman.

Knight, a criminal justice administration junior from Phoenix, would have turned 21 next week.

Although it was his first day of skydiving, Knight was on his second dive when the accident occurred.

"He was jumping at 3,000 ft. It is unclear whether he pulled the wrong cord or something got caught up in his leg," Brunenkant said.

Knight was with a group of three other skydivers, none of who were family or close friends of Knight, Brunenkant said.

The Marana Skydiving Center and Federal Aviation Administration are still investigating the incident, but authorities know Knight's first jump took place between 1:30 p.m. and 2 p.m.

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High school girl struck in crosswalk near UA

A girl crossing North Euclid Avenue just north of East Sixth Street was struck yesterday by a vehicle traveling southbound, officials said.

UA undeclared freshman Ryan Thomas told police he was traveling southbound in the median lane on North Euclid Avenue and approached a line of stopped traffic. He then switched to the curb lane to avoid stopping and struck the 15-year-old Tucson High School student, said Lisa Peasley, Tucson Police Department spokeswoman.

The woman was crossing the street in a clearly marked

pedestrian crosswalk, Peasley said. Thomas called TPD to report the incident, Peasley said.

University of Arizona Police arrived at the scene and the woman was conscious and alert, said UAPD officer Dustin Goudschaal.

Tucson Fire Department arrived shortly after, and though the woman had no visible injuries, transported her to a local hospital as a precautionary measure, Peasley said.

Goudschaal said all of the traffic in one lane traveling southbound had stopped for the pedestrian, but the student in a white 1987 Honda Accord could not stop in time.
